


# LCA 10: Skomer & Skokholm







#### **Description of existing woodland coverage**

This Landscape Character Area (LCA) is characterised by the two offshore islands of Skomer and Skokholm which lie to the north and south of Broad Sound. Landcover is dominated by semi-natural coastal heath and grassland habitats with areas of scrub and bracken. The islands are devoid of woodland and mature trees.

### Designated features and valued attributes within the LCA The focus of this Guide is on the sensitivity and opportunities for woodland creation in relation to landscape character. It can only play an advisory role in the weighing of potential benefits of woodland creation against likely impacts on non-woodland habitats and cultural heritage assets, which should be considered in more detail at site level. Please refer to the main report for more detail. SAC, SPA, SSSI Skomer, Skokholm and the Seas off Pembrokeshire SPA covers 451.5 ha (100% of the LCA). NNR, LNR (including Wildlife There are two SAC within the LCA which cover 159.5 ha (35.3% of the LCA). Trust/ RSPB reserves) There are two SSSI which cover 93.8% of the LCA. Skomer and Skokholm NNR covers 87.1% of the LCA. National Park Register of Skomer Island is a Historic Landscape of Special Interest in Wales covering 310.4 ha Historic Landscapes (68.8% of the LCA). Scheduled Monuments, The LCA includes 74 HER records, which cover a range of archaeological and historical Conservation Areas, Listed features, including scheduled and undesignated monuments, listed and non-listed historical Buildings and HER data buildings and locations of finds. These features date from prehistory up to recent times.

Landscape sensitivity to new woodland planting							
	■ The distinct flat plateau landform of the offshore islands, with dramatic cliffs marking the coast.						
	■ The naturalistic landscape with semi-natural maritime grassland forming the dominant land cover, interspersed with areas of heath and bracken. The islands are internationally and nationally designated as SPA/SSSI/NNR for the natural habitats and important colonies of sea birds they support.						
	Prehistoric field patterns which are legible on the islands.						
Key sensitivities	Internationally significant archaeological remains, including prehistoric agricultural and settlement features and Iron Age fort. The northern part of the LCA is within the Skomer Island Registered Landscape of Outstanding Historical Interest.						
	The islands form landmark features in views from the mainland and the sea. The Trinity House Lighthouse (Grade II listed) on Skokholm adds to the sense of place.						
	Open and exposed character with an absence of human influence and panoramic sea views.						
	■ The perceptual qualities of the islands are ever changing, influenced by the surrounding sea.						
Overview	Both islands are valued for their internationally important semi-natural habitats including maritime grassland with small areas of heath, internationally significant archaeological features and remote and exposed perceptual qualities. The whole of this LCA is highly sensitive to any scale of woodland creation as planting would significantly alter the character of the islands and could have an adverse effect on the special qualities of the islands.						
	Landscape sensitivity to all scales of mixed woodland for this LCA is high.
