CYNEFIN DISCOVERY DAYS

Cynefin: Often translated as "habitat" it is not just a place in a physical or geographical sense; it is the historic, cultural and social space that shapes the communities which inhabit it.

Pembrokeshire has a wealth of opportunities for learners exploring their landscape, habitats, and heritage. Our Schools Programme provides accessible learning experiences all year round. Cynefin Discovery Days are multi-disciplinary, engaging learning experiences with:

- science, literacy and numeracy activities
- creative response
- · mindful enjoyment of the health and wellbeing benefits to being in the landscape.
- Cynefin Discovery Days are delivered at various locations with Rangers and Centre Staff



CYNEFIN DISCOVERY DAYS



Coastal Explorers: beaches, rockpools, dunes, cliffs, caves, islands and estuaries. Making use of accessible

facilities and the Pembrokeshire Coast Path there are many exciting regional and seasonal itineraries. Explore the variety of landforms, habitats, heritage sites, communities and tidal spectaculars offered around the coastline.



Meadows and Minibeasts Grassland habitats contain a wide array of flowering plants, tremendous diversity of pollinating

bugs and other wildlife. Explore the delights of a summer meadow with our Conservation Team and perhaps be inspired to take steps to enhance meadow biodiversity in school grounds.

River Study from Source to Sea Follow a river from its source on the Preseli Hills to the coast. Pupils explore

the water cycle, river habitats, measure the water flow and learn about the way people use and interact with the river. Other rivers can be used (e.g. Gwaun, Nyfer) to suit pupil ages and school locations.

Castell Henllys Iron Age Village

Castell Henllys is the only Iron Age Village in Britain reconstructed on the exact site where our Celtic ancestors lived 2,000 years ago. Here you can walk in the footsteps of the

Demetae tribe. The School Programme offers heritage education activities which explore the Iron Age hill fort and the surrounding National Park landscape.

- A Day in the life of Iron Age Celts. Meet the tribe and see how they lived, what they wore and what they ate. Learn to cook, build a round-house and how to become a warrior.
- Sustainable living: traditional crafts and skills
- Oral traditions of story telling in a legendary landscape
- · Other living history experiences looking at Roman and Stone Age periods
- · Woodland and freshwater habitats.

Carew Castle and Tidal Mill



Carew Castle and Tidal Mill's rich history spans over 2,000 years and tells of knights of the realm, kingmakers, Elizabethan intrigue and Civil War devastation. The only restored Tidal Mill in Wales. The school programme covers a range of heritage education activities, exploring the history of the Castle and its inhabitants. Sessions can focus on the Tudor period or castle life.

- Tudor Tales: The Lord is due to arrive at the Castle any minute! Pupils help the Castle servants prepare for his arrival, trying activities including weaving, cooking, masonry, pottery, calligraphy, before performing a Tudor play.
- Immersive and fun living history scenarios: The Great Tournament/Capture the Castle/Horrid Histories/Knight School
- · Food, farming and renewable energy at the Tidal Mill
- · Estuary and meadow habitats.
